**CARING CONVERSATIONS**

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Tell or think about someone who has died and who was a loving gift to you.
- Describe or think about what being a saint means to you.
- What is your vision of heaven and how is that important to your daily life?

**DEVOTIONS**

Read: Revelation 7:9-17.

The seer of this heavenly vision allows us to imagine the future of loved ones who have died, especially those who have shaped our own lives of faith with their living witness. Most likely they did not experience the kind of persecution envisioned in Revelation, but all lives know the pain and turmoil of daily struggles. In the end, what remains of their—and our—sufferings and disappointments are swept up in a larger reality, one that sees the Lamb at the center. This is Christ, our shepherd, who suffered and died and through whose blood our lives are purified that we all may stand before the throne of God. The truth of the reign of God through the Good Shepherd is that all our sorrows will be wiped away. We look to a future where there are no more tears, no more sadness to overcome. Yes, there is a great victory in life, it is the victory of the Lamb who was slain and now begins his reign of "[b]lessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and power and might . . . to our God forever and ever! Amen" (v. 12). How does this text give you comfort for loved ones who have died? How does it bring comfort for your own life?

*Pray: Almighty and living God, we thank you for the promise of life and love and peace for all the saints—past, present, and future—through Christ our shepherd. Amen.*

**SERVICE**

In the Bible, we learn about the disciples, the first followers of Jesus. They are set apart by God to witness to Christ and are called saints. All Christians are saints. In what ways do you witness to Christ through acts of service to others?

**RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**

All Saints Day is a time to remember all the saints in our lives, both the living and the dead. Take a white, plastic tablecloth, cover the table with it, and write on the tablecloth the names of those who have blessed your life. Place a candle in the center. Light the candle and pray:

**Dear God, thank you for the witnesses who have touched my life with faith, love, and hope. I thank you for (read the names) through Christ, the Lamb of God. Amen.**

**CARING CONVERSATIONS**

- Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:
- Tell or think about something that you do with focused attention.
  - How does paying attention help you do your best?
  - Jesus wants his followers to stay alert and be ready for his coming. How is this important to you and to others?

**DEVOTIONS**

*Read:* Matthew 25:1-13.

This parable seems harsh. We might think we are to have mercy on the foolish and not lock them out. A more merciful approach is evident in the next chapter when Jesus' leadership team of disciples falls asleep while Jesus prays in the garden (26:36-46). Jesus chastises them without a sense of rejection. In this parable the church is reminded to live with the final victory of God in Christ in view. It is to impact our daily lives as we wait for Christ's second coming. However, unless there is a particular experience of suffering, we tend to live without paying much attention to Christ's coming again. Jesus is alerting his followers to the importance of watchfulness of the times and readiness to act faithfully at any given moment. That is when the church blesses, serves with justice, and offers salvation in Jesus' name. How might a conscious awareness of Christ's victory and return to "Judge the living and the dead" (Apostles' Creed), impact your daily conduct?  
*Pray:* Come Lord Jesus, strengthen our lives of faith that we may anticipate your coming again with joy and serve our neighbor in love. Amen.

**SERVICE**

According to Amos, worship without acts of justice for the needy is meaningless to God. During and after a worship service, take time to think about how God's acts of love and mercy for you and all humanity lead you to do acts of kindness and love for others.

**RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**

The foolish bridesmaids in the parable did not have additional oil for their lamps. The light in their lamps could not shine. They were not ready. It is important to be ready and let the light of Jesus' love shine. We can do this by being ready to do God's work everyday. One way to be ready is to pray for others, read scripture, and bless others. Use this blessing daily during this week: **May the light of Christ shining through you show your readiness to do God's work.**



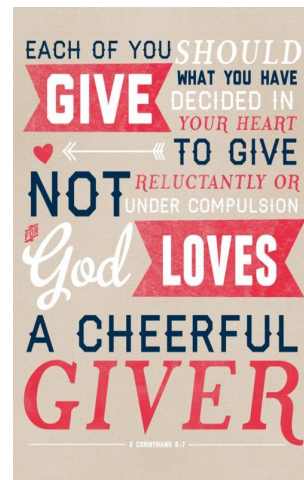

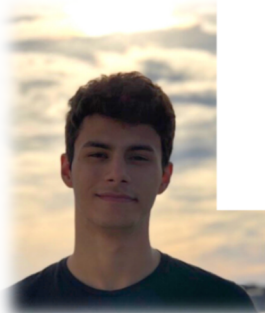

**WEEKLY MILESTONES**

**CARING CONVERSATIONS**

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- How do you support someone when they are discouraged or are feeling down?
- How has someone supported you when you were in need of encouragement?
- Why do you think Christians need support and encouragement from one another?

**DEVOTIONS**

*Read:* 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11.

Good times and hard times can happen—and change—rather quickly (v. 3). Daily life is fragile. Life experiences can change dramatically with a phone call. What is constant is the need to care for one another and build up the body of Christ. There are important connections between this text and the parable of the talents in Matthew 25. God has gifted us to use our vocation, our calling in life as a child of God, to do God's work in the world. If we do not do this, if we ignore or hide our calling, the ministry of the church suffers. Instead, we are to trust in a God who acts; we are not to fall prey to complacency and speak and live as though God is not present and active in our lives and history (Zephaniah 1:12). Paul reminds the people that they—and we—are to reach out to others—especially our brothers and sisters in the faith. We are to do so with encouragement to live each day in faith, love, and hope because of the God who acts and has given us “salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ” (1 Thessalonians 5:9). How are you encouraged by others to live your faith? How do you encourage others?

*Pray:* **God of grace, we thank you for the cloud of witnesses that walk alongside us to strengthen us in faith, love, and hope through Christ. Amen.**

**SERVICE**

Jesus' parable of the talents makes a strong case for every Christian to have a calling, to use one's gifts and passions to serve the church and the world. Make a list of how to use your gifts and talents to serve the church and world around you.

**RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**

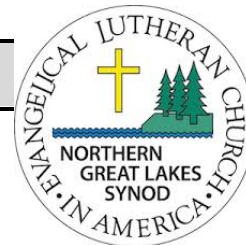
A talent in Jesus' day was money. Jesus tells a story about three servants. One hid his money and never used it. In our day, we think of a talent as a natural ability to be good at something. If we are good at something, we should not hide our talent but use it to the best of our ability. Drawing, singing, and dancing are a few talents. Think of what talent(s) you have and in what ways you can tell others about Jesus by using that talent. Each day this week choose one talent to use and say this prayer: **Dear God, help me to use my talents, whether big or small, so that others know you. Amen.**



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## UPDATE FROM BISHOP FINEGAN



Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod,

October 5, 2020

Grace and peace to you in these glorious Autumn days!

Last week, Governor Whitmer announced that because of rising COVID-19 cases, the Upper Peninsula was being returned to Phase 4. Hardly moments later, the Supreme Court of Michigan declared that the Governor's ongoing emergency orders were unconstitutional. Together, as the church, we ask the good Lutheran question, "What does this mean?"

Both our Northern Wisconsin and our Upper Peninsula congregations now find themselves in the same confusing space where the Governor has issued orders without the legal capacity to enforce them. In our Lutheran polity, the enforcement of any behaviors rests with each congregation's council. It is the work of each congregation's leadership together to discern and decide what their guidelines will be for when in person worship will happen and how it will happen given the realities of an ongoing pandemic. Resources for all that needs to be considered are on our Synod Website.

That being said, those in Michigan have only to look at their Wisconsin neighbors to see what happened when the orders of the Governor were ignored. Wisconsin hospitals are filling up, case numbers are rising exponentially, and many congregations have wisely pulled back from, or refrained from engaging in, in-person inside worship.

I write to encourage you to raise the bar from what is legal to what is advisable. Do not plan on in-person, inside worship unless the numbers in your county are flat or decreasing. If worship is held in person, please continue to require masks, especially in indoor spaces, and practice physical distancing from each other, which is only possible if numbers are limited in your indoor spaces. The guidelines that have been put forth by the Wisconsin Council of Churches still hold true regardless of any executive order or constitutional challenges.

And these best practices also continue to be advisable for your movement in and through your community. Masks and physical distancing, while not fool proof, are the best weapons we currently have to slow the spread of the virus.

I know that our situation feels like it's getting worse. We are weary and feeling the strain. But there is good news! Those who study the emotional impact of disasters have noticed patterns in how populations respond during times of trial. At about six months into a disaster, there is a period called the "Disillusionment Phase." I believe this is where many people are currently. But that's not the good news. The good news is this phase has an end point. A day will come when we will move from the Disillusionment Phase, marked by weariness and anxiety, to the Reconstruction Phase, which is marked by new creativity, energy, and a coming to terms with the changes that we have witnessed. So, please be encouraged. Even as we are in the thick of it, know that this too shall pass. As we are all feeling stretched thin, please be gentle with each other. Be even more patient, even when you don't feel like it. And let your pastoral leader and your councils know that their efforts to lead and decide and consider so many things are deeply appreciated. They are doing the best they can to keep you safe and still embrace you with the presence of Christ through the community of faith. If you feel yourself being pushy, relax. If you are tempted to cast judgement, reconsider. A day is coming soon when we will feel creative and energized, ready to begin again as we move into a new future of being church together.

**WEEKLY MILESTONES**

Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

**CARING CONVERSATIONS**

- If you had all the power you could want, what would you want to do?
- What is wrong with the religious leaders in the Bible using their power for themselves?
- Why is it good news to know that God cares for the poor, the sick, and the hungry?

**DEVOTIONS**

*Read:* Matthew 25:31-46

The God of the Bible is the God of justice but not just any kind of justice. God's justice recognizes the unfairness of power that abuses the weak. In Ezekiel 34 God has had enough of Judah's unjust shepherds, specifically, the kings who have not taken care of God's sheep. Therefore, God declares the sheep that are lost, strayed, injured, and weak will be cared for by God's power and the fat and the strong sheep—supposedly those well off at the expense of the weak—will be destroyed (v. 16). That is the divine judgment Jesus presents in the parable of the sheep and the goats. God's will—Jesus' will, as seen in the Son of Man in the parable—is to provide for the needs of the hungry, thirsty, lonely, naked, or sick. The message is so strong that when anyone has cared for these, they have cared for the Son of Man. The Gospel of Matthew does not shy away from judgment that distinguishes the authentic from the inauthentic life of those who follow Jesus. Matthew speaks against those who abuse their powers, whether religious, social, political, or economic. This final Sunday in the church year recognizes that all evil abuses will end one day and only God's compassion will survive through Christ, the true ruler of all things. How do you live as though Jesus, the Son of Man is with you as you show care and help others in need?

*Pray:* **Almighty God, help us to see you in our neighbors, especially those in need of care through Jesus Christ, the one who is above all rule and authority. Amen.**

**SERVICE**

Whether you live in an urban or rural setting, there are many in need. Donations of time and money are appreciated by those in need and the organizations that help them. Think about how you can help support these individuals or organizations.

**RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**

Read Psalm 95:1-7a and circle or say the action words like "sing," "make a joyful noise," "bow down," and "kneel." Reread the psalm out loud and act out the parts you highlighted. Afterward, close with this blessing: **May the Lord God rejoice at the sound of your joyful noise and songs of praise.**

Dear Church,

### Where are you going?

This has got to be the most commonly, asked question when any one of us head out on this thing called VACATION.

Where are you going, our friends ask. Well, in 2020? We could easily answer that: NOWHERE! Or, perhaps we might say we're going to the FRIDGE. Or we're going to the LIVING room or the COMPUTER room. But GOING, going? Not happening these days.



Instead of focusing on where we CANNOT go these days, might I challenge us to reframe our thinking about where we CAN head? I'm guessing we could all use some positive thinking these days:

We're **GOING** to take in each day as it comes. Why? *"So we do not lose heart. Though our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day."* (2 Corinthians 4:16) We can choose to view each day as a new gift to be unwrapped

We're **GOING** to remember that even Mary and Joseph didn't get to celebrate Christmas where they wanted to, either. **THANKSGIVING DAY MILESTONES**

Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

**CARING CONVERSATIONS**

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Name or think about something for which you are thankful. Explain.
- Give an example or think about when you have been a cheerful giver.
- How does practicing generosity impact your life?

**DEVOTIONS**

Read: Luke 17:11-19.

There is a difference between what one wants to do and what one needs to do. Jesus tells the healed lepers that they need to go to the priests to confirm their healing, and they do.

However, only one leper is compelled by an inner desire to return to Jesus and offer thanks. Although all ten are healed, Jesus says to the Samaritan, the outsider who desires to give thanks, "your faith has made you well" (v. 19). These are the same words used by Jesus in other stories in Luke, including the woman at his anointing (7:50), the hemorrhaging woman (8:48), and the blind beggar (18:42). In Luke 7:50 the phrase is translated, "Your faith has saved you." The same Greek words can be translated as "saved you" or "made you well." Health and salvation belong together. A thankful heart belongs to both health and salvation. How is your health strengthened by a thankful heart? How is your faith strengthened by thanksgiving? By cheerfulness?

**Pray: God of glory, we thank you for your generosity that blesses us with health and salvation, through Christ our Lord. Amen.**

**SERVICE**

Giving with a thankful heart blesses both the giver and the receiver of one's generosity. Practice generosity this week and think or talk about how it blesses you as well as those who are the recipients of your care.

**RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**

The first Thanksgiving was held in the early 1600's by Puritans and Pilgrims immigrating from England to America. President George Washington proclaimed the first nationwide celebration in November of 1789 "as a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God." Invite each person at your table to name something they are thankful for and then after each person has shared, conclude with: **Thanks be to God for the Lord's indescribable gifts! Amen.**
