PASTORAL MUSINGS FROM PR. BRENDA

Dear, dear Church,

As you all know, I **live** directly across the highway from Gethsemane Lutheran Church. This means that when I look out my front, picture window, I have a direct line of sight to the wooden **cross** in front of the Church.

Now, for MONTHS, I have had a front-row seat to whichever <u>fabric</u> happens to be draped over the cross: purple Easter. (Yes! It's a whole season, not just a day!)

MOST times, the flag would be waving in the breeze, and I'd say a quick prayer of thankfulness that I get to serve two fantastic congregations here in the UP. SOME days, however, the fabric would have become tangled during the night. The one side would be all twisted-up and caught on one of the arms of the cross. Other times, it would look as though someone had knotted the entire thing TO the cross. Either way, if it had not UNtangled or UNknotted itself, I would drive by the cross, and set things straight, and put the fabric back in place.



I must have done this for **WEEKS** before realizing: how incredibly **FUTILE!** What was I accomplishing!? Here I was, cleaning up the CROSS: the symbol of such a violent and horrific act upon which our God's SON was killed. Clean-up the cross!? Who did I think I was? Humanity was what put Jesus up on that cross to begin with, and here I thought I could straighten up the cross.

When this thought finally hit me, I sat on the ledge, near the cross, and thought about ALL the ways we try to clean-up, to sanitize the Cross and the message of the Gospel:

- we tell the good, ole familiar Bible stories, and leave out the ones that would mean some hard, personal work for us
- we pick hymns that only focus on love and joy, and omit the ones that would mean actually having to think through Christ's sacrifice
- we do silly things like trying to tidy-up the fabric on the cross, when in fact, the cross did the straightening-up FOR US already.



Our Christian past - and the happenings on the cross - are neither neat nor tidy, and nor is the path forward. But lest we think there are only knots and entanglements ahead, we must also remember the **HOPE** and **GRACE** that the very cross itself gives.

I leave you with this <u>second picture</u>: some free-flowing fabric on a cross, bags of manure to fertilize the soil nearby, and bright greenery surrounding bulbs just ready to burst into life. I couldn't help but chuckle when coming upon this scene! **Such is life:**

- •we're going to be blown about a bit, but will land and cling to the promises of the Cross,
- •life might STINK at times, but the struggle just might fortify us for that next battle, and
- •the blossoming promise of new and beautiful life is always near. Thanks be to God!
