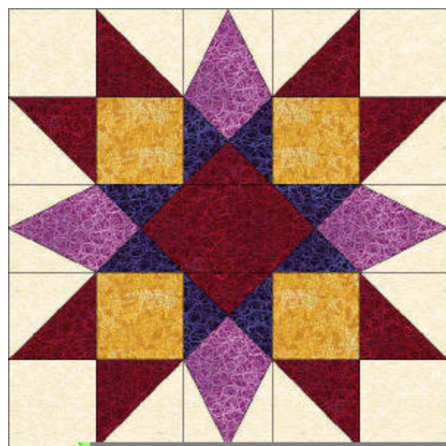

Pastoral Musings from Pr. Brenda

Dear Church,

Well... **FA LA LA!** No, I'm not losing my mind, and launching into a festive greeting, MONTHS before any of us are really ready to hear it. Nothing like that. **FA LA LA!** is actually my go-to phrase when things are frustrating. As in...



FA LA LA! ...when I trip over one of my kittens and they send me flying into the corner of a piece of furniture.

FA LA LA! ...when I happen to have misplaced my keys. Again.

FA LA LA! ...when Rodgers gets sacked or throws another interception.

FA LA LA! ...when I read the latest County stats on mediocre vaccination rates and high infection rates.

Perhaps **FA LA LA!** was YOUR expression, upon getting the latest news about having to revert back to Parking Lot Worship. I know it was mine, even if it was absolutely the right move to make. Our Councils understood what it took to keep you and our neighbors safe, and made the right call. It can still feel like, well, **FA LA LA!**

Recently, I had the pastoral honor of being present at a particularly, painful **death caused by COVID** at our local hospital. After honest and raw conversations with devastated family members, the patient was removed from life support, and we waited for death to occur. Only a certain number of family members could be present in the ICU, and all of us had to don **head-to-toe** coverage to protect one another.

This meant we had to leave grieving family members to watch helplessly from **outside** the first-floor window of this ICU room. Gathered together on the other side of the glass, they were not able to embrace their sobbing loved ones, not able to reach out and hold this dear, dying patient. FaceTime calls were made, with one family member after another professing their love via an electronic means - not able to lean in to whisper these tender thoughts, but having to say them into a phone held by a stranger. It all felt just so **wrong**.

I've weathered this COVID storm as bravely as possible, dear church, taking prudent precautions, proceeding with facts and information (not fear or hype), and I have to say: **that night changed me**. I've been at the bedside of over 100 deaths, made phone calls from Emergency Rooms to inform folks their lives have changed for the worse, been present alongside roads and highways where fatalities have occurred...but **this. was. different**.

The forced separation of the COVID-19 virus has stripped us of **intimacy** - the closeness we yearn for in our extreme times of need. We naturally rebel at being told what to do, even if it is often for our own good, never mind the good it might do our neighbors. Just this week, our County has moved from the "Very High Risk" level to the "Severe Risk" level. Our frustration levels are high, we are OVER the bad news of this pandemic, sad that it's disrupted our lives again and again. **And yet.... FA LA LA:**

Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steady **FA**st, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain. **1 Corinthians 15:58**

Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribu**LA**tion, be constant in prayer. **Romans 12:12**

Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness.

And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, **LA**cking in nothing. **James 1:2-4**

DEVOTIONS

Read: Mark 10:2-16.

When we read that the Pharisees ask Jesus about divorce, our bodies can easily tighten. Divorce has touched all of our lives. We know that at times divorce, as painful as it is, is better than remaining in a hurtful relationship. Jesus goes to the heart of the matter: God desires life-giving relationships, not divorce. Why is this so important? Because in Jesus' day women and children paid the greatest price in a divorce. Family life is foundational to our social fabric. For much of our history—and especially during Judaism of the New Testament—the protection provided by the shelter and wealth of a husband and father was essential to survival. Without it, women and children were left poor and ostracized by society. Today, men, too, can be the ones left with grief and distress. Jesus is speaking here to defend defenseless lives. He is teaching his disciples as they journey to Jerusalem to care for the helpless, the poor, and the socially dispossessed. This story in Mark about divorce, women, and children ends by caring for the two groups hurt most in a divorce in his day: women and children. He does not chastise them. He offers them his healing care, lays his hands on the children, and blesses them. How have you helped people who have been affected by divorce?

Pray: God of life and healing, help us to care for one another and to protect one another with our words and our actions through the healing touch of our Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

SERVICE

Genesis 2:18-24 has real humor woven into the story of the creation of the woman. The all-knowing God has difficulty finding a helper and partner for the human being just created. Finally, God creates the woman as the perfect match. In describing the greatest mysteries of life, the Bible can be playful. As you enjoy relationships with others, be sure to find time for play and humor with those around you this week.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Go outside at night this week when the night sky isn't hidden by clouds. When you go inside, talk about the beauty of the sky and the different constellations that you saw. End your time by reading Psalm 8. If you are with others, close with this blessing:

DEVOTIONS

Read: Hebrews 4:12-16.

God's word is like a sharp, two-edged sword that brings both judgment and forgiveness. The question is, which is God's final word for us? The answer Hebrews gives is through understanding Jesus in the sacrificial role of high priest, one who is like us in every way except that he is without sin. The high priest makes sacrifices on behalf of the people to receive God's forgiveness for their sins. What Jesus is able to do as our great high priest and the Son of God is to both experience and feel our weaknesses as a human being and as God. We have a God who fully understands us, sympathizes with us, and accepts us as we are. We can approach God with boldness and know that we receive mercy and grace. Jesus as the great high priest and the Son of God takes the sharp edge of the sword of God's judgment and adds to it God's love that forgives the sinner. Thanks be to God for Jesus, the great high priest, the Son of God, who comes to save, not to condemn. How does Jesus as our great high priest help you understand judgment and forgiveness?
Pray: God of mercy and grace, free our lives to live courageously for our neighbor and with loving hearts toward you through Jesus, the great high priest. Amen.

SERVICE

In Mark 10, the rich man left Jesus grieving because he was attached to his wealth. Money and having possessions can cause us to be selfish and only care for ourselves. Another way to use wealth can be to serve others and show our love for God and all humanity. How can you serve others with your wealth this week?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Hebrews 4:12 says that the word of God is "living and active". There are many Bible translations: The NRSV (New Revised Standard Version), NIV (New International Version), KJV (King James Version), and CEV (Contemporary English Version) are just a few of many others. DEVOTIONS

Read: Mark 10:35-45.

We may be tempted to think that prayer puts God in our back pocket to use as we wish. Not so! As Jesus pointed out, James and John did not even know what they were really asking of Jesus. To ask the Son of Man for something, is to ask the source of the universe who has a different standard of what is important and what is valued. James and John wanted wants love and service; openness to suffering is the glory Jesus sees. James and John wanted power. Jesus redefines power into servanthood and bondage to the needs of others as a slave. As Jesus gets closer to Jerusalem, there exists a growing urgency about understanding what it means to be a follower of Jesus. Jesus puts it in crystal clear terms, but words that do not necessarily please our "old world" way of seeing goodness, truth, and beauty, or power and glory. You want to know what it means to follow Jesus? Pay close attention to Jesus' words: "whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all" (vv. 43b-44). How does being a servant—even a slave—upend your understanding of a successful life?

Pray: God of power and glory, cleanse us of our desire for personal glory and give us hearts for love and service through Christ Jesus, the Holy One of God. Amen.

SERVICE



According to Jesus, doing acts of service is not so much a list of projects as it is a way of life. How is your life a life of service? How is caring for the needs of others a life you wish to pursue with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength? Take time this week to use your gifts to serve others with a glad heart.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



In Mark 10, Jesus talks about kings who like to order people around and have full power over their lives. Jesus tells us not to be like them, but to be servants of others, a much, more humble way of life. This week pray: **Dear God, give me a humble heart that I may gladly be a servant of others through Christ our Lord. Amen.**

DEVOTIONS

Read: Mark 10:46-52.

In Mark 8:22-26 Jesus heals another blind man. However, in that instance, it took a couple of tries and the man is sent away back to his home. With Bartimaeus, Jesus heals the blindness instantly, and, this time, the man joins Jesus immediately. Something is happening. Jesus is now closer to Jerusalem and the real testing of his identity as Savior. Bartimaeus utters words that the church will expand and recite throughout its history. Those words are called the Jesus Prayer: "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner." Jesus acknowledges Bartimaeus' faith. It involves the life experience of need, of hope, of a dream, just like people have expressed through Psalm 126. As Jesus approaches Jerusalem and his trial, suffering, and death, he clarifies what it means to be a disciple. It looks like someone much like Bartimaeus, someone in great need with great hopes and dreams, someone seeing hope realized in Jesus, the Son of David, Lord of lords, King of kings. What do you need from Jesus?
Pray: God of mercy and hope, give us faith to trust in you and joy to follow you all the days of our lives through Christ Jesus, our Savior and God. Amen.

SERVICE

Statistics from the World Health Organization state that there are at least 2.2 billion people globally who are blind or have a vision impairment. At least one million of them could have been prevented. Used eyeglasses can be donated to a variety of organizations to be recycled and distributed to those in need or uninsured. Do you or someone you know have eyeglasses they no longer use that could be donated to a local organization?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Bartimaeus' plea to Jesus is very close to one of the many historic versions of the Jesus Prayer used for spiritual formation: "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner." Pray this prayer daily before reading Psalm 126, a song of joy. Confessing our need for God is freeing, healing, and meant to be filled with joy, yes, leading us even to laughter.

WEEKLY MILESTONES

Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

CARING CONVERSATIONS

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Sin is about broken relationships with others and with God. What does sin mean to you?
- God in Christ only saves and frees sinners. Is this a surprising message for you? Explain.
- How does confessing one’s sinfulness bring joy?

DEVOTIONS

Read: Romans 3:19-28.

Luther was not the only reformer shaped by Paul’s letter to the Romans. Romans became a signature book of the New Testament to reform the church’s practice away from a message that suggested that our eternal life with Christ was dependent upon our actions. Through Christ’s work—not ours—we are redeemed. John Wesley, founder of the Methodist Church, was “strangely moved” by hearing Luther’s commentary on Romans. Wesley saw in this letter that being justified by Christ through faith meant that followers of Jesus were more than people set free from sin. Salvation was the restoration of the human ability to bear God’s image in the world. Luther called this being a “little Christ” to one’s neighbor. We have all fallen short; redemption is a gift of God received through faith. By the grace of God through faith, we are God’s people participating in the work of Christ in the world. We are now the ones reconciling all that is God’s back to God. We are made right with God through faith in Christ that we may be the hands, feet, and voice of God’s healing work in the world. Where have you witnessed God’s healing work in the world?

*Pray: **Awesome God, help us to believe and give thanks every day that our relationship to you is a gift of your undeserved kindness through faith in Christ Jesus. Amen.***

SERVICE

We have been born anew to a living faith that sends us out into the world on behalf of God’s love through Christ. How can you be part of Christ’s ongoing work of healing lives today? What might you do this week to extend Christ’s love to someone?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Before the Reformation, the Bible was written in Latin, Greek, and Hebrew. It was not accessible to the common person. An important part of the Reformation was to translate the word of God in the Bible to a language people understood. Luther translated the Bible into German. Other reformers translated the Bible into other languages. In appreciation for the fact that the Bible can now be read around the world in many different languages, including your own, take time this week to read and highlight some of your favorite Bible passages.
