
Looking Ahead: SAVE THESE DATES!

Eat this Bread, Drink this Cup

Dear Church,

Back in 1997, the Fifth Biennial Churchwide Assembly of the ELCA adopted **The Use of the Means of Grace: A Statement on the Practice of Word and Sacrament.** The document offers precisely what its title suggests: it sets the <u>standards</u> by which the use of the <u>sacraments</u> should be followed.

The document (available online or can be borrowed from Pastor Brenda) upholds the teachings of the **Book** of **Concord** (basically, all the things that Lutherans confess - and is also available online or can be borrowed from Pastor Brenda) and applies them to **present-day** worship.

I tell you about these important, pieces of **Lutheran** writing because it is by these **standards** that the decision has recently been made to switch from alcoholic **wine** to **juice** during Holy Communion.

"Some communicants suffer from allergic reactions or are recovering from alcoholism... For pressing reasons of health...Congregations might decide to place ... non-wheat bread or nonalcoholic wine or grape juice on the altar. Such pastoral and congregational decisions are delicate, and must honor both the tradition of the Church and the people of each local assembly." **Part III, Principle 44, Application 44C**

This change has been done to **accommodate** those who are abstaining from alcohol, those with an allergy to wheat, gluten, or grapes. Nowhere in the written Word of God do we see a command or requirement relative to the **fermentation** level of the cup's contents, nor is any preference given in **The Use and Means of Grace** document to unleavened or leavened bread. Since both forms of bread have a precedent in Christian history, both are acceptable. The same logic has been applied to what we drink.

There was a **phrase** used above (and many times in **The Use and Means of Grace**) that was the guiding light when making such a decision: "Such pastoral and congregational decisions are delicate, and must honor both the **tradition** of the Church and the **people** of each local assembly."

Honoring both **tradition** and **people** - *that*'s the key here. Various practices have changed and been modified over the years: monthly communion vs. weekly, common vs. individual cup, bread vs. wafer. When **even one** person cannot partake in the Meal set before us, however, we must **re-evaluate** our traditions, and find ways to make God's table accessible and welcoming to absolutely **ALL**.

"The [elements] of Communion are handled with care and reverence, out of a sense of the value both of what has been set apart by the Word as a bearer of the presence of Christ and of God's good creation." **Pt III, Prin. 47**

In addition to these **practical** reasons, since we know that Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper for our **benefit**, we can hold a faithful confidence that **God** continues to guide our conversations and decisions regarding this matter. We **gather** for Communion, as the **wheat** is gathered from the fields, and the **grapes** from the vine, together with the **saints**. I invite you to receive this change in the manner in which it was presented: with **trust** in our Savior's promise of presence, and **grace** in our hearts.




Dwelling in the Word

Colossians 3:16

Dwelling in the Word is a 20-30-minute process for becoming aware of God's presence and the Spirit's movement by listening and reflecting on Scripture as a gathered community. Dwelling in the Word forms faith and trust within a group by sharing responses to three questions:

- 1. What captures my attention?
- 2. What questions do I have? What do I wonder?
- 3. Where might God's Spirit be nudging us?

The word "**dwell**" or "**abide**" is used frequently in **Scripture**. It means to live or remain somewhere or with someone for a time. The practice of Dwelling in the Word invites communities to live with a text for a time so that the reflections, wonderings, and



promptings of God's Word form and shape our faith and living. The purpose of Dwelling in the Word is **not** about answering questions or getting to particular results, but rather allowing ourselves to be present with God's living Word. (*Thus, Dwelling in the Word does not require a leader steeped in biblical scholarship.*)

Join the whole Northern Great Lakes Synod in Dwelling in the Word.

Visit **https://bit.ly/DwellNGLS** for monthly Scripture passages that you can use to begin your meetings: Council, quilting, Faith Formation, Women's Group - whatever meeting you have, begin with this brief devotion and Dwell in the same Word together.

Also, you are invited to join the **Synod Council** (*Pastor Brenda will be there*), via **Zoom**, to Dwell in that monthly Word the first **Thursday** of every month, beginning in September. The Zoom **link** will be on the Synod website.


