Finding a Way Forward

Dear People of the Northern Great Lakes Synod,

I'm on Facebook. I do not comment often, unless it is to wish someone a "Happy Birthday". I see recipes and gardening tips, anniversary announcements and pictures of baptisms. I also see people I know and love posting polarizing memes that demonize those with whom they disagree. And I suspect the post that was shared can trace its origin to those countries most interested in sowing seeds of discord and division in our country.

It is concerning, especially as we journey towards our November elections and all that is at stake in our votes. I do not write to tell you how to vote. That is not the way of the ELCA Lutheran Christian. I do write to encourage you to be mindful of how you engage in conversation and discernment leading up to this year's election. There are people in your congregation who love you and who disagree with you. Will you demonize them? Will you lump them in with those you deem to be unworthy? Or will you extend grace, be kind, and forgive them for not agreeing with you?

Abraham Lincoln, who shepherded the United States through the Civil War, stated, "America will never be destroyed from the outside. If we falter and lose our freedoms, it will be because we destroyed ourselves."

I hope and pray that as tensions rise, as political lines are drawn, as alliances are declared, that our communities of faith will remain places of civil discourse, open conversation, and unified in our commitment to proclaim Christ and work for his mission. We are first and foremost citizens of the kingdom of God – not Republicans, not Democrats, not Independents. The lens we apply to politics is that of the open tomb, to weigh and assess the policies and positions of candidates based on how well they align with the priorities and example of Jesus. This, of course, is not so easily done. But the task becomes easier if we consider what is important with others, in our community of faith, employing conversation, prayer, and debate that allows for mutual respect in the midst of varying perspectives.

I encourage you to be careful of what you post and find out first:

- Is it true? Check the news source.
- Who generated the post?

Do not be an unwitting accomplice to outside influencers.

- Does it further the conversation?
 - Or simply drop an emotional zinger meant to inflame and increase anxiety.

Keep in mind that conversation around such important and complicated subjects is best held in person. Social media provides a distance that reduces meaningful discussion to soundbites and allows people to be their worst selves. Do not be your worst self. It is at times such as this that the Church and your church can be a place of not just civility, but of safety and hope. Whatever the election results, whatever the reaction to those results, we, the body of Christ, will continue to be united in ministry for the sake of the one who died and rose to save.... even those who nailed him to the cross. By the grace of God, our forgiveness will be just as inclusive and will bear witness to the power of Christ to heal, to reconcile, and to find a way forward...together.

I Love to Tell the Story

Dear Church,

I'm using my article space this issue to give you a heads-up about an exciting, biblical shift that will occur beginning September 1: not only will our worship **TIMES** change that day (St will worship at 9a for a year, and G will worship at 10:30a) but we will also be changing our Scripture format – how we **TELL THE**



STORY - to what is known as the *Narrative Lectionary*. *What does this mean*, you ask? Such a good, Lutheran question! *Read on:*

"Lectionary" = the assigned, weekly, reading lists we read aloud in worship

We have been using what is known as the "Revised Common Lectionary."

- Organized into 3-year cycles of readings: 1st, Psalm, 2nd, Gospel.
- The years are designated **A** (Matthew), **B** (Mark), **or C** (Luke), with John sprinkled into each, and follow that order (Year ABC, ABC, etc.)
- Each yearly cycle begins on the first Sunday of **Advent** (usually early December) and conclude with **Christ the King** Sunday (usually late November).
- Was used to give congregations a wide-breadth of Scripture (and to keep those Pastors who only want to preach on their favorite Biblical passages from repeating themselves!)

Come September 1, 2024, we will be switching to the "Narrative Lectionary."

- The Narrative Lectionary focuses on teaching the larger story **(narrative)** of God and God's people found through the Bible, from Creation to the early, Christian Church.
- The Bible is a **library** of writings from a long period of time containing many different genres of literature. The NL helps tell a series of stories that facilitate an **understanding** of/**appreciation** for the broader biblical story.
- Told in canonical order (in a **ninth-month** cycle (September May)

Unique Features of the Narrative Lectionary (NL)



The **NL** has just **<u>two</u> readings each week**:

• A "**preaching** text" (from the Old Testament through Advent, a Gospel from Christmas to Easter, and from Acts/Epistles from Easter to Pentecost)

• An "**accompanying** text" (the accompanying text is from a Gospel when the preaching text is from the Old Testament or Acts/Epistles, and from a psalm when the preaching text is from a Gospel)

Each congregation is different and that what works best depends on **context**. Some congregations have found it most helpful to read **just** the assigned narrative lectionary text on a given Sunday. Others have found it helpful to find complementary texts to use **with** the assigned reading.

Looking forward to TELLING THE STORY in all sorts of new ways, Church!

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- FALL: the narrative lectionary moves rapidly through the Old Testament story beginning in Genesis around the start of September and culminating with the promise of the Messiah during December (Advent).
- WINTER: The narrative lectionary moves in order through one Gospel — tracing the story of Jesus in canonical order from birth, through ministry, passion, and culminating with the story of the resurrection at Easter.
- SPRING: the narrative lectionary engages part of the story of the early church, as told in Acts and other New Testament writings.

SUMMER: Each summer session contains at least three units, including at least one series from the Old Testament; one series from the New Testament; and one catechetical series (Ten Commandments, Sacraments, Creeds or Lord's Prayer).

WHY are we trying this, Pastor Brenda?

Most Christian preaching **assume** that worshipers already **know** the basic biblical story and thus most Christian preaching does not seek to **equip** people to know the biblical story. The NL seeks to be one part of an approach that seeks to **equip people** to know God's story — to **find themselves** in God's story and to find in that story the love of the God in Christ. This is the exciting part for us, dear Church – the chance to know these stories **ANEW**!

Narrative threads include emphasizing that the **Bible** is a story of:

- **Belonging**: God created a creation that would belong to God, where everything within the creation would belong to everything else. God's gracious activity includes reknitting the relationships of belonging.
- **Creation and re-creation**: God created the world in such a way that creation renews itself. But God has graciously intervened to bring about re-creation and the Bible ends with the promises that one day all creation will be brought to consummation.
- God working through deeply flawed people and institutions: God's choice to work through broken people (*Abraham and Sarah*, *Joseph*, *David*) and broken institutions (*nations*, *monarchy*) to bring mercy and love to creation.
- The importance of the Old Testament for Christian faith: We often lack an understanding of how the Old Testament is Christian scripture and what role the Old Testament plays in mature Christian faith.
